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Our Waters at Risk Focuses on Western Carteret

Ocean, N.C. – Residents of western Carteret County can learn about the health of local rivers and creeks at a community meeting Tuesday, May 20, at Western Park Community Center in Cedar Point.

Sponsored by the N.C. Coastal Federation, the “Our Waters at Risk” meeting is free and starts at 7 p.m. It is the second of two in Carteret County. The other was held May 20 at Smyrna Elementary School.

At the Cedar Point meeting, Dr. Joe Ramus, a professor at the Duke University Marine Lab near Beaufort, and Wayne Mobley, chief of the N.C. Shellfish Sanitation and Recreational Water Quality Section, will describe what polluted runoff can do to coastal waters and the effects it has had on the White Oak River, Bogue Sound and other waters in western Carteret County.

Bill Norris of the Onslow County Water and Soil Conservation District will describe a new program that helps homeowners pay for methods to control stormwater around their homes. Margie Misenheimer, a Gloucester resident and a teacher at Smyrna school, will explain how people can get involved in community projects to control stormwater.

Frank Tursi, the federation’s Cape Lookout Coastkeeper, will demystify the state’s new rules to control polluted runoff in the coastal counties, debunk some of the myths surrounding the rules and describe ways people can show their support for clean coastal waters.

“The meeting is a great opportunity for the people in the western end of the county to learn about polluted runoff and what it might be doing to the creeks in their backyards,” Tursi said. “They’ll also have a chance to learn the truth about the new stormwater rules and how they can support cleaning up our coastal waters.”
