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Help Clean Up Our Coast at Big Sweep Event

OCEAN -- The N.C. Coastal Federation invites volunteers to help clean up a coastal marsh between Morehead City and Beaufort in Carteret County on Saturday, Oct. 19, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. The cleanup is part of the fall N.C. Big Sweep.

"Growing up in a large, polluted coastal city, I know how lucky we are to have such pristine coastal environments here in eastern North Carolina," said Lexia Weaver, a coastal scientist at the federation who is from the Miami area. "By doing these cleanups, we can keep it that way."

In addition to picking up trash, volunteers will also help collect information on the kinds of debris collected. This information will help to understand where our clean water laws are not working and to pinpoint the sources of debris in order to help enforce laws and focus educational efforts.

Volunteers should register through the federation's web calendar at <u>www.nccoast.org</u> and meet at the Causeway Pier on the left after crossing the high-rise bridge from Morehead City into Beaufort at 1 p.m.

Please bring wading boots, waders or shoes that can get wet and muddy. Trash collection supplies and data cards will be provided as well as drinks and snacks. Children under 12 will need to be accompanied by an adult. Scouts will be given credit towards merit badges.
